SURVEY METHODOLOGY

This survey was conducted online within the United States from September 8 – 9, 2022 among **1,851** registered voters by HarrisX.

The margin of error is +/- 2.3 percentage points.

Results were weighted for age, gender, region, race/ethnicity, income, locale, education, political party, and political ideology where necessary to align them with their actual proportions in the population.

KEY FINDINGS



There is uncertainty in our election system. A third of voters feel Biden was elected unfairly and almost half of Democrats acknowledge there were at least minor problems with counting votes.



Confidence in American institutions has remained stagnant under President Biden.



Voters are evenly split on whether Presidents Trump and Biden fostered national unity or created further divisions.



Majorities of voters say that most government institutions are increasingly becoming politicized.




How would you describe the process of counting the votes in the 2020 election? (By Party)

Do you think that the 2020 election was tilted against Donald Trump by big tech, the media, the FBI and other organizations or not tilted against Donald Trump?







Do you think Donald Trump accepted the results of the 2020 election or did he blame it on fraud?






A PERSISTENT 3 IN 5 MAJORITY OF VOTERS SAY CONGRESS IS NOT WORKING AS AN INSTITUTION





FEWER VOTERS SAY THE JUSTICE DEPARTMENT AND THE FBI ARE WORKING COMPARED TO LAST YEAR






How much confidence do you have in the government to fulfill its role in the following areas?







Confidence in the federal government, including the President, Congress, and the federal courts, achieving goals from the preamble of the United States Constitution (Showing Average)




VOTERS ARE FINE WITH THE POWERS OF THE PRESIDENCY



A MAJORITY WOULD KEEP THE POWER OF CONGRESS THE SAME TOO




VOTERS INCREASINGLY SAY THE SUPREME COURT SHOULD HAVE LESS POWER

Which part of the federal government do you think is the most effective at doing their job, the President, Congress or the Supreme Court? (By Party)



Do you favor or oppose a plan from some Democrats to add 4 new members to the Supreme Court and have them picked by the Biden administration? (By Party)












IN 2022, OVER HALF OF VOTERS ACROSS THE POLITICAL SPECTRUM WANT MORE CHECKS AND BALANCES



VIEWS ON BIPARTISAN GOVERNING ARE UNCHANGED FROM LAST YEAR







Is regulating carbon and climate change by the EPA just interpreting older statutes or does it require new legislation addressing the problem? (By Party)


Should the president be able to take actions that restrict drilling for mining/fossil fuels or should it require congressional approval? (By Party)

Do you think that the system of creating bipartisan legislation in Congress has broken down or is working well?



PLURALITIES BELIEVE EACH INSTITUTION ASIDE FROM THE U.S. MILITARY IS BECOMING MORE POLITICIZED








Do different leaders mostly answer to the national interest or their party caucus?







Was the Supreme Court right to make gay marriage a constitutional right or should the court let each state decide?












