SURVEY METHODOLOGY

This survey was conducted online within the United States from September 8 – 9, 2021 among 1,803 registered voters by HarrisX.

Results were weighted for age within gender, region, race/ethnicity, income, education, political party, and political ideology where necessary to align them with their actual proportions in the population.

KEY FINDINGS



Although voters say that America is currently on the wrong track, they are optimistic about the country's future



Majorities of both parties support keeping the filibuster as important check on power, although support among Democrats decreases after reading more information



Most voters say that Congress is not working, but that the other branches of government are. Congress is seen as powerful yet ineffective, while the Supreme Court is seen as effective, yet not very powerful





Just above half of voters believe that the use of executive orders has been proper and appropriate, though this view has primarily been driven by Democrats




THERE CONTINUES TO BE CONFIDENCE IN THE FUTURE OF THE UNITED STATES AMONG ALL RACIAL GROUPS





VOTERS HAVE THE MOST CONFIDENCE IN THE MILITARY, FOLLOWED BY THE SUPREME COURT











In general, do you think each of these institutions/levels of Government, regardless of who is leading them at any given moment, should have more power, less power, or the same power as now?

















Do you think people who hold major positions in the government are now more or less likely to be recognized by the average citizen? (By Party)



























MOST VOTERS WANT TO KEEP THE FILIBUSTER IN PLACE




















Do you think the supreme court was right to make gay marriage a constitutional right or should the court have let each state decide the issue? (By Party)








